

## The timeline of legal chaos in California's rush to execute Albert Brown

August 1, 2010 until October 1, 2010

August 1 <sup>st</sup>	Mitchell Sims files new Administrative Procedures Act challenge (Sims vs. CDCR)
August 20 <sup>th</sup>	Notice sent regarding hearing to set execution date for Albert Brown in Riverside
August 30 <sup>th</sup>	Hearing held and execution date for Albert Brown set for Wednesday, September 29 <sup>th</sup> at 12:01 am
August 31 <sup>st</sup>	Marin Judge rules that the injunction on executions remains in effect from Morales v. CDCR
September 20 <sup>th</sup>	Court of Appeals rules that injunction from <i>Morales v. CDCR</i> is no longer in effect but plaintiffs may seek a new injunction in <i>Sims v. CDCR</i>
September 24 <sup>th</sup>	Judge Fogel orders execution can proceed but says Mr. Brown must choose between the three drug protocol or a one drug protocol
September 25 <sup>th</sup>	Attorney General reveals that the CDCR has a limited supply of sodium thiopental and that the entire supply expires on October 1, 2010 at 12:01 a.m.
September 26 <sup>th</sup>	Mr. Brown filed appeal in the 9 <sup>th</sup> Circuit Court
September 27 <sup>th</sup>	Marin Judge denies new TRO in Sims v. CDCR—Sims and Brown immediately appeal
September 27 <sup>th</sup>	Governor Schwarzenegger delays execution to September 30 <sup>th</sup> at 9:00 pm, after Attorney General realized the death row inmates have more time to appeal Sept 20 Court of Appeal decision
September 27 <sup>th</sup>	Attorney General files writ with the Supreme Court, asking the court to take extraordinary measures to resolve any possible appeal of the Sept 20 ruling within a two hour window of time on Sept 30
September 27 <sup>th</sup>	9 <sup>th</sup> Circuit Court remands to Judge Fogel to reconsider his September 24 <sup>th</sup> order
September 28 <sup>th</sup>	Judge Fogel issues stay, concluding he needs time to review the new procedures
September 29 <sup>th</sup>	California Supreme Court denies AG's request to change the rules for review so they can proceed with execution. As a result Marin Judge's August 31st ruling in Morales v. CDCR continues to block the execution.
September 29 <sup>th</sup>	Attorney General concedes and the execution of Albert Brown is cancelled until a thorough and lawful review of the new lethal injection protocol is completed.
October 1 <sup>st</sup>	The CDCR's limited supply of Sodium Thiopental expires at 12:01 am – just three hours after the scheduled execution of Albert Brown
